

The *Columbus Enquirer*, of the 19th March, says—
“By order from the Secretary of War, Major Wager, commanding at Fort Mitchell, issued a proclamation on the 16th inst. ordering out of the Creek nation all white men who are not entitled to remain there as countrymen by the Indian regulations. They are ordered to depart by the 15th inst. The persons engaged in digging for Gold in the Cherokee country are also ordered off; and we are informed that a company of United States' Troops passed a few days since through Decatur, DeKalb county, on their way to execute the order. Resistance is apprehended by some, but a gentleman recently from that section, tells us that the intruders have no such designs.”

We can quiet the apprehensions of all peaceable citizens, as far as the citizens of Georgia are concerned. There will be no resistance to the constituted authorities. The gold diggers of this state say, they are ready to go when others, of other states, are run off, and when the Indians are prohibited from digging also. But as long as others are suffered to remain, they are disposed to have a share of the plunder. At our last accounts the Agent was in daily expectation of orders to remove the intruders, and it is said to be his intention to stop the digging altogether, both by the Indians and whites. We think this should be done. The Indians have no better claim to the gold than the whites, and neither have the shadow of a right.
