

*Mr. Wirt and the Cherokees.*—Since the article, on Indian Affairs in another part of our paper, was arranged, we have seen it stated in the public prints that John Ross was on his way to visit Judge Johnson of the United States' Court, and that if any encouragement is received from him, Judge Marshall is next to be visited.
