

We understand that on Monday last, John Ross, the President of the Cherokees, went into the Executive Office at Milledgeville, and served on the Governor some process from the Supreme Court, in contravention of the jurisdiction of Georgia over the Indians, but not signed, like the former one, by Chief Justice Marshall—entering abruptly into the office, and retiring from it quickly without saying a word—perhaps anticipating—what we understand was intended had he been subsequently found—that the Governor would return the compliment, by serving some process, quite as abruptly, on him, under the authority of the laws.
