

☞ A friend in Lawrenceville has informed us that the address of the Rev. Mr. Worcester to the Court on his late trial, was published incorrectly both in this paper and the Recorder. He gives us the following as Mr. Worcester's precise words. On comparison, we do not perceive an essential difference in the idea intended to be conveyed between this and the former statement, yet in justice to the prisoners, and at the request of our esteemed friend, we herewith give it a place:

*“ May it please your Honor : If I am guilty of all or any of those crimes which have been laid to my charge in the argument before this Court, but which are not preferred in the bill of indictment, then I have nothing to say why sentence should not be pronounced against me. But if I am not guilty of all or any of these, which I solemnly aver before this Court and before my God that I am not, then I have to say what I have already said, that this Court ought not to proceed to pronounce sentence against me; because the act charged in the bill of indictment was not committed within the rightful jurisdiction of this Court.”*
