

"W. Schley, Esq. has been elected member of Congress from Georgia, in place of Lumpkin, the Governor, having 334 votes against 215, given to Judge Clayton."

This, gentle reader, is an *en dit* from the Charleston Gazette, and serves to show how well acquainted our neighbors of Carolina are with the affairs of Georgia.
