“ We perceive that the Georgia papers generally, approve of the conduct of Judge Clayton, concerning the Indian question. The Judge, despite his warm speech on the presentation of the New York memorial concerning the Cherokees, has gained many strong and disinterested friends since his arrival in this city. No one can listen to his history of the Indian question but with satisfaction, and we shall regret if circumstances force him to return to Washington, without affording him an opportunity at some public entertainment, given in honor of the Bank Committee, of removing somewhat of the prejudice which exists in the minds of many of our citizens as to his conduct, and that of Georgia, upon the subject. It would be a matter of general satisfaction to our citizens, were it possible, to get such eminent men as Col. Johnson, Judge Clayton, Mr. M'Duffie, Mr. Adams, and Mr. Cambreleng, together, at a public dinner ; and surely after the investigation is over, one day might be afforded to such a scheme. We are all desirous of hearing these eminent statesmen and patriots speak in public, and it is probable that Philadelphia will never have another opportunity.”
