

*Judge Clayton.*—It is stated by several of the South Carolina papers, that this gentleman gave the following toast, at a dinner given him lately at Laurens C. H. in that State, which toast he prefaced with a speech, in which he sustained the principles of the Nullification Party to their fullest extent: "The Tariff of 1832 has placed the case fairly before you, *Liberty or Submission.* He that dallies is a dastard—He that doubts is damned."

This, as Mr. Guieu observes, requires confirmation: we too are incredulous on the subject, inasmuch as the last Richmond Enquirer brings us a very different version of the Judge's sentiments, with regard to *submission*, &c. On his return from Washington City, at Lynchburgh, Va. he was invited to partake of the 4th July festivities at that place—on being toasted, he delivered in reply an eloquent speech; and on adverting to the Tariff, he spoke of its oppressive bearing upon the South, &c. "And though (said he) as friends of the Union we should *submit*, yet we will not relax our exertions to rid her of this iniquitous system."
