

**Great Anti-Nullification Meeting at Augusta.**—We have received by the late Augusta papers the proceeding of this meeting, but they came to hand too late for publication in our present number. Next week we will publish, should our limits allow, the whole of the proceedings. The meeting was large and respectable. General Valentine Walker was called to the chair, and James McLaws, Esq. appointed secretary.

The preamble and resolutions presented to the meeting by Col. W. Cumming, after considerable discussion, in which Mr. Forsyth, General Flournoy, Col. Cumming, Mr. E. F. Campbell and others took a part, were finally adopted by a majority of at least three-fourths, which resolutions denounce the doctrine of Nullification as "false in theory," and if put in practice as "most dangerous to the country"—they further disapprove of the convention proposed by the Athens meeting, as a delegation of power too broad and unrestrained, and calculated at a moment of excitement like the present to wield a dangerous influence. They propose, however, to elect delegates to the convention should a contrary opinion prevail, with a "protest against the authority of any acts of that convention, which are not duly ratified by the people in their respective counties!"
