

The Election.—We publish to-day complete returns from fifty-seven Counties. The balance of the counties to be heard from are small, and so much divided, that they cannot vary much the Congressional Election from its present complexion. Messrs. Wayne, Wilde, Gilmer, Clayton, Gamble and Jones are certainly elected; the contest for the two other Representatives will lay between Messrs. Schley and Branham, and Coffee and Haynes; our present impressions are that Schley and Coffee are elected. Parties in the next legislature will be very equally divided. In the counties heard from the Clark party have a small majority in the Senate, and the Troup party a majority of from ten to twelve in joint ballot—this position of the parties may however, be very materially changed by the result of the Election in the counties to be heard from. This election proves to us very conclusively, that the republican party has a very decided ascendancy in the State. If the Troup votes thrown away on Lamar, and the nullifying Troup votes on Newnan and Milton, had been concentrated on the regularly nominated Troup ticket, it would have been elected entire by a majority of from three to four thousand votes. We hope the party will now profit by experience—cease its bickerings, heal its divisions, and once more present a front so firm and united as to resist the wiles of its weak, but ever active and cunning adversary.
