

The Cherokees.

The late movements of these people and their advisers and friends, satisfy us that the policy of the State and the General Government, with regard to them, will be consummated during the present session of Congress. No less than three distinct delegations from the nation have repaired to Washington City—the hostile party delegation, opposed to emigration, headed by John Ross—the emigrating delegation, headed by John Ridge—and the *best-bargain-that-can-be-made* delegation, headed by JUDGE UNDERWOOD. The memorial of the emigrating delegation was presented to the House of Representatives on the 19th inst., by Mr. E. Everett, and that of the hostile party to the Senate on the 21st, by Mr. Frelinghuysen. The former is in favor of the emigration of the whole tribe west of the Mississippi, and the latter proposes to sell to the U. S. for the use of Georgia, all their lands not needed for their own personal use and enjoyment, on the condition that they be allowed to remain, and be recognized by the State as equal in political privileges with other citizens of Georgia. The *best-bargain-that-can-be-made* delegation has not yet been heard from.
