

THE CHEROKEES.

The last Milledgeville Recorder contains a letter from Gen. Scott to Gov. Gilmer, under date of Oct. 15th, from which we learn that four detachments of the Cherokees were then on their march to the west, three or four others were to follow that week, and as many more the following; and the remainder are already organized into detachments and eager to march. All will soon be off, except a few of the old and decrepit, with their friends, who are to wait for the rise of the rivers, to go by water. The General estimates the number who were in the territory when he entered it, at 15,500, of whom only 500 were of the treaty making party. These were emigrated in a separate detachment. About 2,500 of the anti-treaty party emigrated in June last. It is said that most of those who left the camps lately have been brought back; and a universal cheerfulness and willingness to remove prevails.
