We the Grand inquest for the county of Jefferfon, on our ouths prefent, iff. As a great grievance the bad con-dition of the public roads and bridges; and as we find it a subject of general complaint in other counties, we are induced to believe that the present system is defective in policy and inadequate to the accomplishment of the great and falutary purpoles of making and keeping good roads and bridges. We therefore take the liberty of recommending to the General Affembly, laying of a moderate tax which will reach every person here liable to work on the roads, to lieu of the prefent mode, in which it is found that the greater number avoid turning out and labouring as the law direct.

2d. We also present the little regard which is paid to the religious observance of the Lord's Day; and recommend to our magistrates a more rigorous execution of the laws for the prevention and punishment of the violation of this necellary daty. therewith. for this purpole.

3d. We present as a grievance that the laws are not revited and promulgated, whereby the magistrates may be better enabled to perform the duties of their office, and the people at large acquainted J:

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4th. We present as a grievance the want of a court house; and recommend that application be made to the next legiflature for feave to fell a portion of the

commons of the town, to be laid out in lots, in gid of the other county funds

· We perfectly accord with his Honour the Judge in his opinion that the character of grand juries should be above supplanting the finking popularity of any mifchievoes influence, or of adding weight to a domineering faction (and we are happy farther to observe that no such influence has come within our knowledge.) We thould rather reprefs than countenance fuch political evils; and have no hefitation to declare it as our opinion that former grand juries have incled upon that principle. We therefore feel it our duty to dispense with the usual recommendation for the publication of his Honor's charge, it being evidently calculated to produce the effects which he recommends us to avoid by our prefentment, and aims unmerited cenfure at the heads of other departments contrary to his own maxims.

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We further recommend that our prefentments be published.

NOTE. When the charge was delfvered, general fatisfaction was apparent both in the grand jury and the audience; and when they had got to their room, it was proposed, and not objected to, that there should be no party presentments; or any thing attended to but the county bufinefs.

But, on the night of the fecond day of the court, a partial meeting was had, without the prefence, knowledge, or fanction of the foreman, after feveral indivi-dual interviews with the Governor, at which the concluding paragraph of the prefentment was agreed upon.
