THE 14th section of the Milita Law of this State, passed the 10th December, 2803, having enacted, that three years afser the passing thereof, the cloathing and apparel of all Volunteer Corps, already raised, or to be raised, in conformity to the law of Congress, shall be uniform for each fervice recoughout the State; and shall be determined on by the Majer-Generals colt lectively, and that they shall also determine the uniform and badges of the different grades in the militiz of the line; the Major-Generals of the first, second and third divisions of the militia of this State, will convene at this place, on the 19th of August instant, for the purpole of fixing upon and establishing the cloathing and apparel of the Volunteer Corps throughout the State, and the uniform and badges of the different grades in the militia of the line, agreeably to the intention of the aforementioned act. By order of the commander in Chief. GEO. R. CLAYTON, Sec'y. The following Major-Generals met, to wit-Major-General James Jackson, of the first division, Major-General John Twiggs, of the second Mivision, and Major. General John Clark, of the third division. - General Twiggs, as senior officer presided. Colonel Abraham Jackson, and Major Joseph Hutchinson, were requested to act as fecretaries. The Board proceeded to the duties afligned them; and having read the law, and made progress, adjourned until to-morrow morning 11 o'clock. Tuesday, August 20, 1805. The board convened purluant to adjourn-Bent. Present as before, Major General Twiggs in the chair. The beard resumed their deliberations of yesterday, and having considered their powers, do ordain and establish the following regulations, to be in force for the uniform of the different services and grades of the militia of the State of Georgia, of which all officers and others concerned, are to take due notice. Vest and pantaloons blue-Indian booss Round hat, turned up on one side-white button, loop and taffel-with a buck's tail t instead of a plume. Officers and non-commissioned officersfame as their corps. Cloth for officers coats, except officers of the rifle corps, to be good broadcloth; and other parts of the dress in proportion. Side arms--- sabre, or cut and thruft. Black flocks to be worn by all vo-

kind, except epaulets, loop and taffels for hats and sword knots.

Music—coats reverse of their corps—other parts of dress the same.

oval plate with the coiled rattle snake engraved thereon, emblematical of the Georgia Militia, it being the colours under which they first fought in the Revolutionary War, with honor to themselves and their country. The word "Georgia" to be engraved over the snake, and the words "don't tread on me" below it. The snake on all the buttons is to be struck as a distinguishing badge for the same reason.

Cocked bat—plume, white—gilt button, loop and taisel—black rose cockade. Army sash.

Brigadiers-General. The same as the Majers-General, except the stars--- one only on each epaulet being allowed; and the plane--- which is to be black.

Adjutant. General. Same as Brigadiers, but the plume, which is to be white tipped with green. Aids-de-Camp, if of the line or volut-

And the Board also recommend to the Legislature to contract for the striking of a sufficient quantity of buttons, with the rattle snake thereon, for the whole militia

of Georgia, and to distribute them to such of the militia of the line as will furnish coats. The Board also earnestly request the attention of the Legislature to the provision of a sufficient quantity of arms for the whole of the militia of Georgia. No nation can expect to be always in peace, and in case of a rupture, the militia of the flate could not enter the field on so respectable a footing,

as those of other states, which have provided for this object: no one will deny but that an efficient militia is the furest safe guard of our General and State Confiftutions, and of the liberties of the citizens at large, and that without it, a ftanding army, the bane of all free governments, becomes necessary.
