I have been se with him all night, and closed his eyes just se at the dawning of the day. ce It is now more than twenty years since es we have been intimately afficiated in the educies of public life. A part of the duty

s which I teel to be left to me is, to dees clare, that in sterling integrity and honest se devotion to the public good, I have never er found his superior. Death has bereaved the State of a General and a Statelman, who was no less valiant in the field, than comment in the cabinet. During our revolutionary war in the days of

peril, he exerted his atmost powers in defence of his country's rights, and performed acts of heroism—and in her cooncils both at home and abroad, he advanced and improrted the interest of the State, with stern integrity, undaunted perseverance, perspicuity of mind and flow of elequence. So great were his public virtues that, from an early part of his life, he held the first and most distinguitted appointments, both civil and milita-

EJ, in the gift of his State. To attest the loss Georgia has sustained by the death of her beloved General and patrioric and able katesman, who yielded up his last breath from home, in the service of his country, and to manifelt the estimation in which his worth and services are beid by a
