The Committee on Finance call this branch of their report, without advertizing a communication from His Excellency the Governor, dated, Executive Department, Georgia, Milledgeville, 5th of December, 1821. This communication was occasioned by an address from Frank Brown, Esq. Chairman of the Committee of Finance calling upon the Governor for information on several points, which were deemed indispensable to the faithful performance of their duty. His Excellency obeyed the call of the Committee, through their considerate Chairman. Such obedience might be supposed fully to satisfy the requirements of the case. But in the particular, under the consideration of your committee, the manner seems so much to invade the substance, as to require a solemn expression of opinion, and of the reasons upon which such opinion is founded. Your committee, in their report, in relation to the scruples which his Excellency entertains concerning the formality of the call of the Chairman of the Committee on Finance, consider him as bound to declare that whenever a Committee is raised by the

solemn appointment of both branches of the Legislature, for a specific purpose, the Legislature is conceived to bestow the authority and means necessary to the discharge of the duties enjoined and the labour required. This is deemed especially true of the Committee on Finance. Their seat at the Treasury Board, their direct and constant inquiry into the Treasury, their practice of demanding from the Treasurer and Comptroller, without an order of the Legislature, any and every information, which becomes needful in the course of their investigations, in so intricate a field, as that of the public accounts : in the opinion of your Committee makes it equally fit, as it is clearly necessary, to have an easy and direct communication, with the Executive through the Chairman upon subjects touching his participation and concern in the expenditure of the funds of the State : in the examination of which subject, some new explanations may be found material at every step of the enquiry. So much for the expediency of the practice claimed to be proper by your committee. For the authority of precedent, they refer to the usage of the standing committees in Congress, where it is believed it will be discovered that the Chairman of those Committees, constantly resorts by direct application to the various sources afforded by the Departments of Government, for all information connected with the performance of their assigned duties. Had there been more difficulty in vindicating the course taken by the Chairman of this committee, in this particular instance, upon general principles, all doubt of its propriety vanishes from the minds of your committee, when they recollect that the Governor in his "statement of warrants, drawn upon the Treasury," communicated to both branches of the Legislature, and which was referred to your committee, particularly advertis to cert in vouchers, as of file in the Executive Office, and upon which certain warrants contained in the statements were founded. This reference to those vouchers, your committee conceives was an invitation to them to apply for and receive them agreeably to the indication in the communication of his Excellency, if an examination thereof should be useful to a complete understanding of the documents and statements submitted to their consideration.

The Committee beg leave further to report, that as far as relates to his Excellency's reply to the fourth and last requirement in the note addressed to him by the Chairman of this Committee, relative to the disbursement of Fifteen Thousand Dollars in the late Indian Treasury, they have agreeably to his Excellency's suggestion, referred to this communication, and documents upon that subject, laid before the extra session of the Legislature, and their proceedings thereon. A careful inspection of that communication and those documents, has not satisfied the committee upon the points, their embarrassment upon which, induced the call made through the Chairman. The documents referred to only disclose to your committee the portion of Fifteen Thousand Dollars, which was paid to the Indians without designating whether the money was paid to the Chiefs, or to the use of the whole Nation, and without specifying to which of the Chiefs the money had been disbursed, or how much to each. These were points upon which the committee desired to be informed ; and upon these points they remain still unascertained.
