Judge Davis, of Chatham, it appears, had protested, in the Senate, " against the resolation of that body, pledging the faith, of Georgia to General Jackson at the next presidential election. A protest of the kind from Judge Clayton, has surprised us. His expressed hostility to Mr. Adams, had led us to a belief, that there could be no candidate for the Presidential chair, but what would have been preferred, by him, to the present incumbent. General Jackson is the only person that can compete with Mr. A. The hope of any other individual doing so, would be worse than ridiculous. Judge Clayton's protest, therefore, cannot be con sidered by a large majority of the party to which he attaches himself, consonant with its feelings. As for Judge Davis, his protest, is just such as might be looked for, from an old Federalist, bolstered up by certain republicans, to suit certain contin Washington News. geneies.
