

*Gentlemen*—The time is drawing nigh, when we shall be called upon to exercise our right of suffrages, in the choice of Representatives, to Congress. Public attention is beginning already to be somewhat alive upon that subject. Almost every day we hear the enquiry made, who shall be our Representatives in the next Congress?

The names of several gentlemen have been announced, but as yet no *entire ticket* has been presented to the public. A writer in your paper, over the signature of Lowndes, has presented the names of Alfred Cuthbert, A S Clayton, Wm Cumming, Eli S. Shorter, and R. L. Gamble, as suitable persons to represent, in part, the interest of the state in the next Congress. *To this selection I have no particular objection; but will they consent to serve if elected?* It is hardly to be presumed that Judge Clayton would consent to abandon the Bench for a seat in the Representative Branch of Congress. As for Mr. Shorter, I have more than once heard him say, that he would in *no event* accept of that appointment. *He has other fish to fry.* So there are two out of the five gentlemen named by Lowndes, who in all probability will not consent to serve us. *There is no man in Georgia whom I would sooner vote for, as a Representative in Congress, than Col Wm Cumming. He is a talented man, and the interest of Georgia in his hands would be safe; but will he consent to serve in that capacity? If he will consent, I think I can safely promise him almost a united vote in the up country.*

Permit me to request the favour of you to publish the following ticket, which I believe would be acceptable to a majority of the voters of this state: *R. H. Wilde, A Cuthbert, Wm Cumming, T F Foster, Dr. Wm. C Daniel, H G. Lamar, and Wiley Thompson.*

But, it may be asked, wherefore the necessity of changing the present delegation? "They are all honorable men." True; but I would respectfully ask, if the interest of the state would not be better promoted in the hands of the gentlemen whom I have named, than in those of the present delegation?—The vote of Judge Wayne upon the Resolution introduced by Mr. McDuffie, does not sit very well upon the political palate of *numbers* in the section of the state where I live. But enough on this point for the present.
