Edwin Mounger, Fiq. having on the first day of this month religned hie office as treafurer of the state, and the comptroller general being at that time ablent from the feat of government, I iffaed an executive order, requesting Daniel Sturges, Horatio Marbury and James Meriwether; Efgres to count the money in the treasury, called the Yazoo Depolit, to feal up the bills belonging thereto in as many different bundles as there are bills of different amounts, and after having written their names over the seals of each hundle, to make a statement in writing to me, thewing the number of bills their feveral amounts, and the total amount of money in the treasury belonging to that deposit. Packet No. 5, contains a copy of the exccutive order and the statement above alluded to, by which it will be feen that the amount of that money now in the treatury is the same as when I came into office.

I gave the appointment of treasurer to my secretary, George Roots Clayton Esq. his long course of public duty, which he discharged while in the executive office under a stender salary with talents & great integrity, seemed to me to claim from the government as a reward due his public ment, a higher appointment than the one he held. Indeed I should be wanting in justice to my own seelings and to the several officers whose duties have been performed immediately under my own eye, were I to retire from the government without expressing my sullest approbation of their public condust.
