THE PRESIDENT.

The Mayor of our City has been advised by letters from Savannah, that the President of the United States would leave that place, on Thursday morning last, and, it was expected, arrive in Augusta to-morrow evening. The President will come over land, and not in the steam-boat as has been stated. We have not understood what order has been made for his reception; but presume that the officers of the 10th regiment, will meet him before he arrives in the City, and escort him to the neat and commodious dwelling of Mr. BENJAMIN SIMS, which has been procured for his accommodation. A Dinner at the *Globe*, and a Ball at the *Planters Hotel*, are to be given in honor of the distinguished visitor.

As the President is not expected to arrive until late in the evening, an Illumination of the City, has been suggested; and we think with much propriety.

Although we may be out-done in the "pomp & circumstance" of parade which has greeted the President in various places; yet, no doubt, we shall make as animated a display as any, in warmth and honesty of feeling.
